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Course Aims

The course aims are to:

1. Provide students with a thorough grounding in the practical and theoretical fundamentals that underpin the discipline of computing.
2. Enable students to demonstrate problem-solving and evaluation skills in the design, development and testing of technological solutions to solve well-specified problems.
3. Develop students understanding and application of concepts, principles and practices in the context of well-defined computing scenarios, showing judgment in the selection of appropriate tools and techniques.
4. Develop students command over the management of computing projects consistent with industry best practices and methodologies.
5. Develop students ability to effectively communicate their work to diverse audiences through both written and oral formats.
6. Help students develop the interpersonal qualities and professional attributes required by employers including reliability, integrity, ethical approach, dependability, teamwork and reflection.
7. Enable students to become effective independent learners by taking responsibility for their learning and professional development.

Course Learning Outcomes

The following statements define what students graduating from the BSc (Hons) Computing course will have been judged to have demonstrated in order to achieve the award. These statements, known as learning outcomes, have been formally approved as aligned with the generic qualification descriptor for level 6 awards as set out by the UK Quality Assurance Agency (QAA)⁶.

Knowledge and understanding

Awards

On successful completion of the course, students will be awarded a BSc (Hons) Computing (with Professional Placement).

Students who leave the course early may be eligible for a DipHE Computing on successful completion of 240 credits including all mandatory modules at levels 4 and 5. Those students who leave the course early and, in addition to the above, have successfully completed the sandwich year and have been awarded 120 placement credits may be eligible for DipHE Computing with Professional Placement.

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Students who leave the course early on successful completion of 120 credits including all mandatory modules at level 4 may be eligible for a CertHE Computing.

Course Delivery

The course is delivered at the University of Suffolk Ipswich Campus and the DigiTech Centre located at Adastral Park (with the exception of the sandwich year, during which students are based in a relevant professional practice setting). Students studying full-time on BSc (Hons) Computing with Professional Practice are likely to have approximately 240 contact hours for level 4, 240 contact hours for level 5 and 172 contact hours for level 6. The contact hours will be a mix of lectures, seminars, practical classes and tutorials. Students will normally be expected to undertake 30 hours of independent study in an average week but should be prepared for this to vary based on assignment deadlines and class exercises.

For the sandwich year involving a full year of professional practice, students are expected to engage in 1090 hours of professional practice (including 30 weeks of supervised and relevant work experience), 10 hours of tutorials and online support and 100 hours of independent study.

Course Assessment

A variety of assessments will be used on the course to enable students to experience and adapt to different assessment styles. The assessment methods used will be appropriate to assess each module's intended learning outcomes. Assessment on the course overall will be mainly coursework (including assignments, dissertations, essays, reports, presentations, group work, reflective learning journals and research projects), with four examinations and practical time-constrained assessments. Professional placements will be assessed by 100% coursework.

Course Team

The academic staff delivering this course are drawn from a team that includes teaching specialists and current practitioners. All staff are qualified in their subjects with their own specialist knowledge to contribute.

Course Costs

Students undertaking BSc (Hons) Computing with Professional Placement will be charged tuition fees as detailed below.
