Course Summary

The MSc Public Health Nursing [with Research Methods] [progression route] course is a progression route for students who have successfully completed the PgD in Specialist Community Public Health Nursing and wish to continue their academic study. It provides an opportunity to contribute to their own professional field of knowledge. Critical evaluation of either published primary research papers or data generated from a small scale study aims to facilitate development of the students' knowledge and understanding in relation to both the research process and the evidence base underpinning their own professional practice.

Course Aims

- To enable students to meet the challenges of undertaking research at master's level within their field of practice

Awards

On successful completion of the course, students will be awarded a MSc Public Health Nursing Practice.

Course Delivery

The course is delivered at Ipswich. Students studying full-time on MSc Public Health Nursing [progression route with research methods] are required to complete the research methods module prior to undertake the dissertation. The Research methods module will involve around 36 hours of contact time along with around 50 hours of directed learning activities. Students are likely to have the equivalent of approximately 1 contact hour per week in individual supervision during the dissertation.

Course Assessment

The assessment methods used will be appropriate to assess each module/s intended learning outcomes. Assessment on the course will be in the form of a research proposal and dissertation coursework.

Course Team

The academic staff delivering this course are drawn from a team that includes teaching specialists and current practitioners as well as research specialists.
